St. Marks-in-the-Bowery, a fine late Georgian church to which additions of later periods have been made with a great degree of harmony, is the oldest site of continuous worship in New York. It is sited on land that was once part of Governor Stuyvesant's bouwerie (farm), and reputedly covers the exact spot occupied by his "Bouwerie Chapel", which was built around 1660.

St. Mark's is a happy example of a building that has grown to its present appearance by accretion. All of the additions to it have been classical in vocabulary but they have been designed in the styles of several different periods, all of them typically American. The main body of the church, constructed in fieldstone, was built around 1795-99 and the cornices defining the pediment of the gable end are all indicative of the period. The tower was added in 1807 by Ithiel Town. Four massive pedestals with pilaster strips and Greek detail decrease in size as they ascend. A tall pyramidal spire which terminates in a ball and cross finial was added about 1828 and is attributed to Town and Thompson. The cast iron portico, added in 1854, is Italianate. Coupled Doric columns on high bases support an entablature which breaks forward above each column group, and the whole is surmounted by a balustrade. Each of the two central column groups has an arch between the shafts.

In St. Mark's graveyard are interred many Americans whose names are important in our history, including Peter Stuyvesant, whose family vault is under the church itself, the English governor Sloughter and Commodore Perry. St. Mark's is surrounded by a yard and trees, making it an unusually satisfying building. It is for this, among other reasons, that St. Mark's is now such an important part of the community which it serves with dedication. St. Mark's, wearing gracefully the additions of successive eras, has not neglected the present. Programs directed to the creative neighborhood fill the church and its grounds not only on Sundays but during the week as well.
