Re: Support for landmark designation of 326 and 328 East 4th Street, Manhattan

Dear Chairman Tierney,

The Metropolitan Chapter of the Victorian Society in America strongly supports landmark designation of 326 and 328 East 4th Street in the East Village. These early-nineteenth century Greek Revival dwellings are located in what was once known as the Dry Dock District — bounded on the north by East 12th Street and on the south by East Houston, between Avenue B and the East River. The area was so named because of the profusion of shipyards, foundries, maritime industries and related commerce that operated on the riverfront during a significant era of economic development in New York. Indeed, research has uncovered the fact that one of the house's original owners built the first steamship to cross the Atlantic — a catalyst in the emergence of New York as one of the major ports in the world.

These tiny buildings survive in remarkably intact condition and represent, perhaps, the last remnants in the East Village/Lower East Side of this maritime history. The Metropolitan Chapter of the VSA urges the Commission to designate 326 and 328 East 4th Street to protect them from unsympathetic alterations that would wipe them out as memory sites from a decisive period of our city's past.
