

NYU's promise to nabe

After decades of contention with the surrounding Greenwich Village community over its expansion, New York University yesterday committed itself to a series of planning principles for future development.

"NYU is not in Greenwich Village; it is part of Greenwich Village," said Alicia Hurley, NYU's head of community affairs.

The five principles, agreed upon by a task force made up of preservationists, elected officials, school representatives and planners, address issues such as maximizing

existing space, building within the historic context of the neighborhood and looking to place new buildings outside Greenwich Village.

"NYU tells us they will need 6 million additional square feet, and you can't fit that between brown-

stones," said Manhattan Borough President Scott Stringer, who organized the

task force. "But you have here groups that have been at war with NYU, now ... working with the university."

Andrew Berman,

and a frequent critic of NYU

expansion, called yesterday's

announcement "an incredibly strong step in the right direction."

Most encouraging, he said, is that for the first time these planning principles have been put in writing.
